Lord Hothfield's luggage turns up!

A few months ago I was contacted by Kevin Powles who had bought some old luggage from a well-known on-line auction site because he was looking for old leather straps for a project. When his purchase turned up it was a long canvas bag that would be used for a suit or a uniform; the clothes could be laid flat in it and rolled up so that they didn't get creased. The bag has the look of something the army might use. On it was a label with the words: "Lord Hoth-

field, 74 Albion Gate, Hyde Park, London" which was the London home of the Tuftons around 100 years ago; and on the reverse a Southern Railway label dated February 1946 "To Ashford".

The second Baron (Lord) Hothfield, Johnnie Tufton, held that title until he died in 1952, and he was in the army reaching the rank of Major, so it was probably his military uniform bag. He had retired finally from the army in 1925. It looks like he was travelling to Ashford in February 1946 or at least sent his bag, but why not to the Hothfield Station? This was only a few months after World War II had ended and maybe the army were still occupying his Manor, and surrounding land, while they cleared up and removed their equipment. Perhaps the Lord was coming to inspect his property but had to stay in Ashford if there wasn't accommodation for him in his own house? Sadly we'll never know why his bag was going to Ashford's train station but it has survived in reasonable condition. Thank you to Kevin for sharing this story and for sending lots of photographs.

Village History website update

I'm pleased to announce that we now have all the funds needed to modernise the on-line archive and website of stories and articles on Hothfield's past. I'm grateful to Hothfield Parish Council, Hothfield Education Foundation and Councillors Clair Bell and Charlie Simkins for generously supporting this project. The redesign is already underway so that the website will work better on small devices such as tablets and smart phones, but will still have all the content of the original website. I'll let you know when it's finished.

Hothfield in 21st Century

In 1999 the History Society produced a book on the main events in this parish during the 1900's. The book is still available in paperback, or in Word for Windows and .pdf format on USB memory stick or CD.

Now that we're in the 25th year of the 21st Century what historic events have happened in the first quarter of the 2000's? Off the top of my head:

- the school closed, and became a children's centre, and has closed again,
- the pub closed after briefly being a fish restaurant, and houses have been built in the grounds,
- the WWII NAAFI hut was demolished,
- a flint arrow head was found,
- we had an application for what could have been one of the biggest solar farms at the time, but subsequently reduced in area, and that has paid for broadband for some of the village,
- there's a vineyard selling its own wine,
- a bus service has been curtailed (at a time when we're meant to be using public transport more),
- and there were renovations at the church, and alterations including a toilet and new bell-ringers' gallery.


THE ARTS SOCIETY EGERTON



On 19th May one hundred years ago the first outdoors broadcast by the BBC was of professional cellist Beatrice Harrison playing to and with nightingales in the garden of her Surrey home. Around a million listeners tuned in to the midnight broadcast, and she performed for similar outdoor broadcasts over the next twelve years. On 18th May this year the Natural History Museum of Berlin ran a field trip in the Tiergarten in the centre of the city to teach about the more than 3,000 nightingales that migrate to Berlin every year.

On the Reserve up to 6 singing nightingales have been observed this year, which is a welcome increase on previous years. They nest on the ground, or very low to the ground under scrub or among nettles, a loose gathering of leaves with a lining of grass, roots and hair, so this is another species sensitive to disturbance by dogs. Dense low scrub provides a safe space for parents and young foraging for insects in the leaf litter. Only the males sing, through until mid-June, at night to attract a mate, in the day to warn off rivals, and not from a high perch but often low down in a hedge, easily observed. From mid-June males help feed nestlings and only use an alarm call resembling the croak of a frog. Crowd-sourced recordings made in Berlin have revealed over 2000 song patterns, but an individual bird will work on unending variations of around 190. The trills, gurgles, and whistles are in scratchy contrast to the mellifluous invention of the bird singing in Berkley Square, indeed the almost mechanically precise hard rapid "beats" have been compared to techno music. Some nightingales have been recorded singing non-stop for 20 hours and they seem to sing at their loudest between around 11pm and 3am but I haven't personally checked that. Britain is at the limit of the nightingale's range. They winter in West Africa and seem to migrate across land and narrow sea crossings to Europe and only the southeast corner of England. By 2018 numbers had plummeted by 92% due to loss of habitat, placing them among the 'Red Sixty-Seven' birds on the UK Red List of endangered birds. At Knepp in 1999, just 7 nightingale territories were identified; post re-wilding, there were 40 singing males in 2021.



In June the heathland will be a flowery delight. Despite May roses in gardens, the orchids and cross-leaved heath are late so will be best in June. Sorrel already casts a bronze haze over rabbit-cropped turf, cotton grass nods across the main bog, with very dense communities of species in the tussocks and along the edge of the boardwalk; lousewort, tormentil and milkwort and various grasses and sedges in flower, sundew now visible. Major tree clearance around the bog will help these specialised plants spread and flourish. Fresh scrapes down grass slopes still look raw and bare but older ones have a thin patina of diminutive plants including mosses with fruiting capsules, buck's horn plantain, and bird's-foot *Ornithopus perpusillus* with tiny white pea flowers. The black peaty mud dug up by the pigs is now coated in fresh green growth. The tiniest of the buttercup family and Hothfield's rarest plant, the three lobed water crowfoot appears to be spreading and the sphagnum moss translocation experiment of 2023 seems to have worked.

The brilliant volunteers, have been improving access across the site, building steps down a steep woodland slope, using sand to build up muddy paths, put in new wider gates, suitable for wheelchairs and already appreciated by the moth trapping team with their barrows of equipment, alongside regular tree-popping and myriad other tasks.




There is a small group that meets twice a month on Monday afternoons in Westwell Village Hall.

May in the Vineyard

It has been an exciting month in the vineyard. After an exceptionally wet start to the year and a bitterly cold April, Spring has finally sprung and there has been rapid shoot growth across the vineyard. If you take a look as you walk along the Greensands Way you will see tiny bunches have appeared on the shoots and these will go through the flowering process in June whereby the vine self-pollinates, and the bunches are set for the year - known as 'fruit set'. The weather is absolutely crucial over the next month. We need warm fine days to ensure we get a good flowering period and to set us up for the rest of the year.



In May we held our first tours and tastings in the vineyard which were a great success. Each session had a good mix of people from the village as well as those from the surrounding area in attendance. Away from the vines we have had stands at both the Canterbury Wine Festival and the London Wine Fair, and most excitingly after months of back and forth we have finally fulfilled our first order with Majestic Wine Warehouse for our still Chardonnay. As well as being in some select stores nationwide the Chardonnay will be in Majestic's Grand Tour wine club box for May and will be sat alongside a Cru from Beaujolais, a Hunter Valley Semillon and a punchy red from the Douro, amongst others.

From the cellar we are eagerly awaiting the release of our first traditional method sparkling wine. This was from our first ever harvest in 2021 and has spent seven months in tank plus another 24 months lees ageing. The sparkling is due to be disgorged sometime in June. Disgorgement is the process by which the yeast sediment is removed from the bottle and a cork and cage are affixed prior to release. We do not have an exact date yet, but we are hoping to release the wine in July or August this year!


