POT HOLES REPORTING

KCC Highways and Transportation

Pot holes can be logged at www.kent.gov.uk/roads-and-travel/report-a-problem

We aim to fix:

- Danger faults within 2 hours • Safety Hazards within 7 days
- Routine faults such as potholes, streetlights and soft landscape issues within 28 days (unless we believe it to be more serious in which case it may be done sooner)
- Traffic Signals within 4 hours if they are urgent or within 7 days if less urgent
- Routine drainage cleansing within 28 days, but up to 90 days for complex issues
- All other faults will be scheduled to our planned maintenance

If you telephoned us to report this issue, please consider using our online fault reporting tool next time. It's been designed with the following in mind:

- It's the quickest and easiest way to tell Highways about issues
- See existing faults (raised by customers and highways staff) and highways assets such as streetlights & trees.
- You are able to give us specifics about how bad a fault is and exactly where it is without having to get someone on the other end of a phone to understand it first
- You can upload photos to help us to prioritise repairs
- It saves the council £5 on every enquiry logged online as that's what it costs KCC to manage a phone call and faults go directly to the relevant Highways team rather than having to be triaged first
- The reporting tool can be easily accessed from all kinds of devices (its optimized for smartphones and tablets) and can use local KCC libraries or gateways if you don't have internet access at home
- It frees up our Contact Point staff to handle emergency and complex enquiries

HOTHFIELD HEATHLANDS IN FEBRUARY



The great grey shrike *Lanius excubitor*, that caused great excitement when it appeared on the reserve in early November, has stayed in the Hothfield area, with regular sightings around the village and reserve up to time of writing. Everyone is delighted, as less than 200 birds stop off and overwinter in the UK on their migration from Europe and Scandinavia. At this time the birds are solitary and very territorial, needing quite a large area for hunting sufficient food. Might it come back next winter?

Sadly, its cousin, the red backed shrike *Lanius collurio*, is now virtually extinct as a UK breeding bird, among a shocking sixty-seven UK birds on the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) Red List of Threatened Species. One in four UK breeding birds is at risk, including herring gull, house sparrow, starling and song thrush, familiar birds that we can't take for granted. Since 2009 three birds, serin, wryneck and Temminck's stint, have been declared extinct as UK breeders. Overall, it is estimated that 40 to 50 million birds have disappeared from UK skies over recent decades. Bird watchers and Kent Wildlife Trust volunteers are well-aware of this factor in the wider picture of the UK, in the bottom 10% globally of nature-depleted countries, with on average about 50% of its biodiversity left.

The great grey shrike will fly off to its summer breeding grounds across the Channel or North Sea, but the other pleasing autumn visitor of 2022, the Dartford warbler, is still around and this one is probably a UK resident. Its range is western and southern Europe. We hope it will breed here but it needs freedom from disturbance, particularly dogs, and the right habitat in which to build its flimsy nest low down to the ground. Listen for its scratchy song from the top of a gorse bush. Thomas Pennant, the Welsh naturalist who first described this species, in 1776, used two birds found on Bexley Heath by the ornithologist John Latham, naming it after Dartford. The Dartford Warbler has yet to return to the Dartford area.

Happily, the amazing Ashford Green Team of outdoor volunteers is thriving, but we were all very sad to learn of the death in 2022 of a loyal colleague, Andrew R Runnalls, a computer scientist and academic in the field of data fusion. He was a keen botanist so as well as general volunteering he worked on the botanical surveys on Hothfield that were cut short by Covid in 2020. Andrew lived in Faversham and travelled to Hothfield as it reminded him of heathland near his childhood home.

In December 2022 KWT and local volunteers said fond farewells to Cristina Juan, Co-Ordinator for the Ashford area reserves, who had worked for KWT for more than six years, starting at Sandwich Bay. Everyone will miss her energy, cheerfulness and organisational skills. Cristina and partner are taking time out so 'we can have some adventures, learn new skills, and discover new corners of this planet'.

In 2022 Cristina recommended Rob Insall, a Green Team member who lives off Sandyhurst Lane, for the Marsh Charitable Trust (no link to Romney Marsh) Wilder Kent Volunteer Awards. Rob was one of seven out of thirteen nominations to receive the award. He promptly donated his cash gift to the team to buy more equipment. Cristina wrote: 'He changes from role to role when needed, as outdoor task volunteer, livestock checker, and surveyor for various species.....often at short notice.... empowering the team to go further with projects, allowing staff to focus on other important jobs'. Another Ashford volunteer, Charing resident Dennis Fryer won the award in 2020 and no one was surprised when he donated a chainsaw to the team. Congratulations Rob, and to Dennis, as you missed a mention here in 2020, and as ever, huge thanks to everyone, out in all weathers.

Thank-you to everybody for your patience and understanding as contractor work continues on site. Please don't be put off visiting. There's an additional 100m stretch of boardwalk and many of the paths around the reserve are staying dry after extensive work in the autumn. Suitable footwear is still essential at this time of year; if there is mud on the path, please walk through it and not round it, to protect the fragile path verges. The accessible Triangle Trail (enter from the reserve car park) has an excellent quality surface that is usable by buggies and wheelchairs, no matter how bad the weather.

Please keep dogs close to you at all times, do not let your dog run and play off the paths and through the areas of heather and gorse. Make sure anything you bring with you leaves the reserve with you. Remove litter, dog mess and place all dog bags in the bins as all these items have a detrimental effect on the wildlife. Hothfield Heathlands is first and foremost a haven for wildlife and one of the best spots for wildlife in the county; with your help we can keep it that way.



Stagecoach South East joins £2 fare cap scheme

Stagecoach South East Managing Director Joel Mitchell has contacted us to confirm that his company is participating in the Department for Transport's £2 fare scheme which has just been announced.

Stagecoach bus users in the South East are set to benefit from three months of bus fares of no more than £2 for a single journey as part of the Department for Transport's new fares initiative. All of Stagecoach's local bus services across Kent and East Sussex will offer a maximum fare of just £2 for any single journey between 1 January and 31 March 2023.

Joel Mitchell said Stagecoach South East already offers some of the lowest ticket prices in the UK, but they hope that this new fare scheme will complement its existing range and help to attract new customers to get out of their cars and try the bus over the winter months. The Government promotion also reflects the current pressure on the costs of running bus services, which have increased by more than 40% since 2019. The scheme means all adult and child single tickets on eligible routes will be capped at £2, with any single tickets previously cheaper than this remaining the same price. This nationwide scheme in England is running in addition to other local fare initiatives already in place which we are delivering in partnership with county councils.
