HOTHFIELD HEATHLANDS IN APRIL

The February storms sadly brought down some veteran trees in our area, but thankfully not the diseased ash trees on Hothfield Heathland, as these had already been felled. Kent Wildlife Trust's recent survey of all reserves had identified 17,000 diseased ash trees around the county, with 318 on this reserve. It is expected that 200,000 ash trees on Kent Wildlife Trust reserves will gradually succumb, as we are only at the start of this epidemic. KWT policy is to remove trees where they are a danger to people but leave them if they can fall and decay safely. The result is most obvious along Station Road from the A20 into the village, with young trees threatening to topple across the road now felled and logs neatly stacked. The majority of this timber will be removed and used for wood products or to produce energy.

Ash dieback (*chalara* or *Hymenoscyphus fraxineus*) was first identified in the UK in the South East in 2012, imported on infected stock from the continent (banned from 2012) and probably from spores carried on the

wind. It is an Asian fungus. Its native hosts, Manchurian and Chinese ash, are adapted to tolerate it. European ash, *Fraxinus excelsior*, did not evolve with the fungus, so has no resistance. It is expected to kill off 80% of ash trees in the UK, at a cost of billions to manage and untold cost in loss of carbon sequestering and loss of biodiversity. The fungus overwinters on leaf litter, particularly ash leaf stems. The millions of spores, released from small white fruiting bodies in the late summer, can be blown tens of miles before landing and sticking onto leaves. They penetrate the tissue to grow inside the tree, eventually blocking the phloem, the water transport vessels, causing the tree to die.

Regarding the Hothfield reserve, Ian Rickards explained: 'As the trees begin to decay, they become more susceptible to other diseases and fungi. Many of the trees will be finished off with honey fungus, which destroys the root systems, causing the trees to fall with little warning. Dead ash trees are very brittle, with the branches shattering when disturbed.

This makes it very dangerous for chainsaw operators. To prevent serious harm to operators we are having to use large machinery with protective cabs. Our priority is to remove trees that may fall onto roads or busy paths. Where it is safe to do so, we will leave ash trees to live out their lives and become incredibly valuable deadwood habitats.'

Trees left to decay naturally return nutrients to the ground and provide deadwood habitat and food for mammals, birds, invertebrates, fungi, mosses and lichens and millions of microscopic creatures, helping to increase the biodiversity of the area.

Ash is of one of our most common native trees. Its single-winged seeds germinate readily and quickly develop a tap-root. Ash wood is light, flexible but tough, used for tools, handles for sports equipment, furniture – and the frames of Morgan cars. But losing millions will change landscapes and break connections between hedges, lone trees and woods.

It's a joy to walk on Hothfield Heathlands, and everyone is welcome to visit. Please remember this is first and foremost a haven for wildlife. You can help our work by staying on the main established paths and wearing footwear suitable for coping with the muddy sections. Keep dogs close at all times; do not let your dog run off the paths and through the areas of heather and gorse where they will disturb wildlife.

Make sure anything you bring with you leaves the reserve with you. Remove litter, dog mess, and place all dog bags in the bins. Hothfield Heathlands is one of the best spots of wildlife in the county; with your help we can keep it that way.

Dealing with ash dieback across the KWT reserves will cost hundreds of thousands of pounds. Any support will be very welcome.

Annalie uses her knowledge and personal experience of literary houses - and their collections - to offer a unique perspective on writers and their works.

Livestock Worrying

Do you walk your dog in a rural location?...

Spring is upon us, ewe's may be pregnant / had their lambs and may become territorial. It is an offence for a dog to worry livestock on agricultural land, under the Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 1953. Livestock means cattle, sheep, goats, swine, horses or poultry (including fowls, turkeys, geese and ducks).

Dogs who are ordinarily calm and focussed can become distracted and behave differently when in a rural environment where their sense of smell and chase instinct are easily stimulated.

Plan ahead before walking in the countryside. Take treats with you to keep your dog focused and serve as a distraction if they become interested in livestock.

Keep your dog under control at all times

Don't pass between and separate adult sheep or cows from their young. They may act aggressively to protect their lambs or calves.




The man was astonished. He turned to the woman and asked, 'What is in your spray can? What did you spray on the bunny?'
