London School evacuated to Hothfield

Lesley Berry posted a page on the History Society website to let us know that there is a book about the Mary Datchelor School in London, part of which was evacuated in September 1939 to Hothfield. This was a large school established in 1857 which had sites across different parts of London before it closed in 1981, and Lesley was a pupil in the 1960s. The junior part of the school, at that time based at Camberwell, used one room in Hothfield's school and then later used the Women's Institute Hall on The Street, as well as various buildings in Ashford and other nearby villages. In the book the headteacher of the time, Dame Dorothy Brock, mentions "a 250 year old farmhouse in Hothfield where they had a house mother and two helpers". Dame Dorothy writes of having the "kindliest of welcomes" and, "We were fortunate indeed in the glorious sunshine of those first weeks in September when we were out all day long. I have many pictures of those days in my mind, especially one of a picnic tea-party at Hothfield, under the pines just outside the village school, looking out over one of the loveliest views in Kent." Hothfield's school Log Books include a number of references to the Datchelor girls, and also to numerous other evacuees moved to the area:

<u>2 September 1939</u>: "War being declared and evacuation taking place, the school premises are open for the reception of children. [this would normally still be school holidays as the summer holiday was later in those days] "In the mornings only the premises are used for about 20minutes for the assembly of the Mary Datchelor girls who are at present assembled here." 9 October: (more evacuees have arrived) "No. on roll is nownative children 64, evacuees 18, Datchelor 28. Difficulty is being experienced getting milk as the supplier cannot get enough bottles."

16 October: "Number on roll 82 exclusive of Datchelor children who are educated in our own building but under their own teachers." 20 November: "Two Datchelor teachers are helping with St 2+3"

<u>21 June 1940</u>: "The Mary Datchelor School is being re-evacuated on Sunday to Wales. Materials borrowed from us have been replaced."

The Headteacher wrote to the Kentish Express while on the train to Wales to thank everyone in the area for fostering her children and those evacuated from other London schools, and lists many people including a Mr Meach. Mr Meech (correct spelling) was in Mitchell Farm at the time and his wife received a letter from Queen Elizabeth (Queen Mother) thanking her for her unselfish sacrifice opening her door to strangers and assisting the War effort. A copy of that letter is in our own book "Hothfield in the 20th Century". Lesley posted these Log Book entries onto a group site for former Datchelor pupils, a number of whom have

responded. One of the girls who was evacuated (Frances) had told her daughter (Josephine) the story and said that she had stayed with a young family named Wooliston at Hothfield. Frances later asked that young mother to be Josephine's Godmother thereby cementing a lifetime connection.

In another joint event with the Friends of St.Margaret's Church there will be a small history exhibition in the church. The exhibition will focus on the church and its graveyard; the Hothfield Manor estate where the church stands, and the Tufton family who were the Lords and Ladies of the Manor. The army occupied the site during both World Wars, as well as much of the village, and the church was damaged by a Doodlebug, so the exhibition will also include some of those aspects including the Spitfire



that crashed in the parkland of the estate.

The church belltower will also be opened for those fit and able to climb the narrow stairs for a rare glimpse of the bells and the inside of the spire (minimum age 12years old).

Progress to date

We have now completed Phase 1 and are well underway in Phase 2 of the Hoad's Wood waste removal project: Phase 1 - Waste Sampling

Phase 2 - Site Compound Construction. The Site Compound is due for completion by 9 May 2025.

By completing these phases we have secured permits, licences and key activities for the following:

- Site of Special Scientific Interest (SSSI) assent to conduct sampling works Issued by Natural England
- Ordinary Watercourse Consent to culvert the ditch between Bethersden Road and the site compound Issued by Kent County Council (KCC) Flood team
- Temporary Traffic Road Notice/Order to close Bethersden Road for the duration of the works Issued by KCC Highways
- Great Crested Newt (GCN) District Level Licence to complete the works in an area with GCN activity Issued by Natural England
- Detailed tree surveys followed by pruning and works have removed all trees that were at risk of falling and causing a health and safety risk

All surveys of protected species in Hoad's Wood waste removal area have taken place and mitigations put in place to ensure the disruption to species and habitats is minimised

Next Actions

Earlier this week we have had SSSI assent granted by Natural England to move in to phases 3 and 4 of the project. We will also be applying to the Court to renew our Restriction Order for a further 6 months as it is due to expire in May 2025.

Phase 3 - Access track preparation and site fencing:

Works started on 30 April 2025 and will consist of properly preparing the access track from Bethersden Road to the main waste mass. We will be placing a stone regulating layer and temporary trackway to ensure the equipment and waste carrying vehicles needed to remove the waste can safely access and egress the site. The access route will follow the existing track route. The other key activity will include the erection of stock fencing that will encircle the waste mass and access track to prevent wildlife and pedestrians from inadvertently accessing the site and putting themselves at risk. The fence will be 1.2 metres high and consist of stock fencing on chestnut posts in line with Natural England's requirements. These works are due to be completed by mid-May 2025.

Phase 4 - Main waste mass removal:

- 1) Some preparatory works will need to occur before the waste is removed and these will include the installation of a deodouriser system running along the fence route and infrastructure on the waste mass to ensure the waste is removed without causing any additional damage to the Wood.
- 2) This phase of works will remove waste from the centre of the waste mass extending to 1m from the trees encircling the waste perimeter and the finishing level will be approximately 300 millimetres above the forest floor.
- 3) Our current project plan is forecasting waste being removed from early June 2025 and will be done so using an excavator and a bulldozer and then loaded into 8-wheeled tipper lorries.
- 4) The exact duration of this phase is dependent on the waste composition. If the waste follows the sampling already completed this is forecast to continue this year completing before Christmas 2025 but we will have a more definitive timeline as the project progresses.

Phase 5:



The final phase of the project will deal with the waste built up around the trees and the waste directly on the forest floor. These activities are far more complex in nature and require a greater understanding of the damage done to the trees around the waste mass edge and the amount of contamination in the forest floor. A workshop in mid-May 2025 will go through these activities in greater detail to understand the constraints and to plan how to carry out these works ensuring minimum damage and giving the wood the best chance of recovery.

The Environment Agency has only been directed by the Secretary of State to remove the illegally deposited waste from the site. Natural England will lead engagement with the Environment Agency and other stakeholders on what steps they will take to ensure this doesn't happen again and more information should be available in the coming months.




